Wouldn't it be lovely to be together again? Think of the adventures we'd have!

Lessons are hard and tiring. I have to arrive before six in the morning; lessons are held in the old house on Field Lane. Before we're allowed in, we have to check we're presentable: fingernails, boots, blouses and bonnets, that's how I remember it.

Inside, it's just a couple of old rooms really, with a handful of candles stuck to the walls. It's as cold as an outhouse at this time of year but we're all squeezed together so tightly onto the benches we keep each other warm.

Mainly we learn our letters and how to work with numbers; there's an awful lot of bible verse as well, mind. That's a good thing though, Mother says we need to keep on the straight and narrow if we're to amount to anything in this life or the next. She's a very pious woman.

One of the children in the class said that we might be looking at how to read next week. We're not



allowed books though; I don't think Sir trusts us with them. He's kind enough, I suppose. None of us dares to talk or cheek him. Andrew saw a dog chasing a squirrel in the street the other day and couldn't stifle his laughter; Sir had him out of his chair and facing the cane across his knuckles in no time. He didn't stop crying until he was allowed home at dusk.

Even though he's very mean, Sir is nothing compared to Mr McGill who had me up the chimneys last year. I'm so grateful to be out of that. Some of the children in the class don't know how lucky they are to have never seen the inside of a flue.

Anyway, this candle is nearly out, and I don't even know when I'll get the chance to post this letter. Hopefully, it will reach you before spring or else I shall have to send another to update you.
