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Key Learning: Was Jesus the Messiah?

1 What kind of saviour?

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Think about people needed to help in different situations. What qualities might a person need? Who might help out or 'save' a situation? Explain situation of Jewish people at end of the Old Testament (being persecuted by Romans who were occupying their land) and their desire for a saviour to rescue them, restore them to their land to live under their own laws. Discuss and list characteristics the saviour would need to have – a saviour who could rescue the People of God in their current situation.

What does the Bible expect the Messiah to be?

Read extracts from prophecies of Micah and Isaiah about the coming of the Messiah and list qualities/characteristics identified. These are known as the 'Messianic expectations'. Create a 'Wanted' poster for the Messiah, ensuring there is a link to each of the Messianic expectations, for example: wears a crown; holding a family tree with King David marked on it; Bethlehem birth certificate.

What clues are there that Jesus is the promised Messiah?

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Jewish followers of Jesus gradually began to believe that Jesus was the Messiah (saviour sent by God) and that he fulfilled the prophecies. However, most Jewish people at the time did not believe Jesus was the Messiah – and Jewish people today still do not think he was. Highlight evidence in Matthew's Gospel (1:18-24 and 2: 1-12) that led Christians to believe that Jesus was the Messiah.

What is the real meaning of Christmas? (Part 1)

For Christians, Christmas is a time of celebration of the arrival of the Messiah. Many Christians argue that Christmas has lost its real meaning: Jesus is lost in the tinsel, turkey and TV. The Christian Church use Advent as a time of preparation for the arrival of Jesus. Some Christians have turned to advertising campaigns to get the message across about the 'true meaning' of Christmas. Show examples of church ad campaigns then choose one to analyse.

What is the real meaning of Christmas? (Part 2)

Discuss: why do Christians want to make Christmas about Jesus Christ? What do Christians do at Christmas?' Collate ideas then read about 'Present Aid' and 'Urban Outreach – Christmas dinner on Jesus' (charitable projects). In groups, improvise a dinner table conversation about Christmas plans 1) in role as a non-Christian household, 2) in role as a Christian household.

Why might people think that the world needs a saviour?

Not everyone thinks Jesus is the Saviour from God, but why might people think the world needs one? Discuss: 'In your own hopes for the future, what makes you confident? What makes you fearful?' Imagine that there is a God. If this God sent a new messenger to Earth in the twenty-first century, what would the messenger say? Write a paragraph.
