Demeter



Demeter is one of the more obscure goddesses of Greek mythology, but she played an important role in one of its most famous tales.

She was the daughter of Rhea and Cronus and sister to both Zeus and Hades. The ancient myths say that Demeter and all of her siblings, except for Zeus, were swallowed by their father while they were children. Zeus had to rescue them all! Not a great start to life!

Together with Zeus, she had a daughter named Persephone. Persephone was famously tricked by Hades into living in the Underworld with him. Demeter was furious at this and teamed up with Zeus to get her daughter back. Unfortunately, Persephone had already eaten food in the Underworld, which meant that she was bound to stay there forever.

A deal was struck and Persephone was allowed to return home for half the year. Demeter was the goddess of growth and the harvest, and her sadness forced everything to stop growing whenever her daughter returned to Hades. It was this that the Greeks believed caused winter, and that spring was the time when Persephone returned and Demeter allowed things to grow again.
