Pulse - The heartbeat of the music. Sometimes called the 'beat'. Duration - The length of time each note is played for (long or short). Dynamics - The volume of the music (loud or quiet). Inspiration - Something that gives you an idea about what to create. Pitch - How high or low a sound is. Structure - How the music is organised into different sections. Tempo - The speed of the music (fast and slow). Texture - How many layers of sound the music has (thick or thin). Timbre - The quality of sound e.g. smooth, scratchy, twinkly. Accelerando - A musical term to describe when the speed of the music gets faster and faster. Compose - To create or write an original (new) piece of music.</p>

Topic: Pulse & Rhythm (Theme: All About Me) Term: Autumn 2022		Children will learn to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Clap the rhythm of their name. • Clap in time to music. • Sing the overall shape of a melody. • Play in time to music. • Copy and create rhythms based on word patterns. • Play on the pulse.

Topic: Nativity Rehearsal & Performance Term: Autumn 2022		Children will learn to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Perform as an ensemble using voices as instruments and with some awareness of others. • Perform simple actions, in time, to accompany songs sung.
Topic: On The Island (British Songs And Sounds) Term: Spring 2023		Children will learn to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Sing, play and follow instructions to perform as a group. • Describe music using simple musical vocabulary. • Explore multiple ways of making the same sound. • Represent the same sound in different ways. • Describe how they have adapted a sound using musical vocabulary. • Contribute musically to a final performance. • Create a piece that clearly represents a particular environment. • Extend a piece of music so that it represents three distinct environments.

Topic: Pitch & Tempo (Theme: Superheroes) Term: Summer 2023		Children will learn to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Explain what pitch means. • Identify whether a note is higher or lower. • Create a pattern using two pitches, then play or sing it. • Explain what tempo means. • Identify simple tempo changes in music. • Perform a pattern that gradually gets faster (accelerando). • Contribute to a group composition and performance by creating, selecting, combining and performing sounds. • Suggest improvements to their work.
1	High fliers - To understand the concept of pitch	
2	Pitch patterns - To create a pattern using two pitches	
3	Faster than a speeding bullet - To understand the concept of tempo	
4	Superhero theme tune - To create a superhero theme tune

Topic: Recorders Term: Summer 2023		Children will learn to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Introduce staff notation to play a tuned instrument with a selection of notes and basic rhythms, beginning to learn appropriate musical vocabulary to understand and act upon pitch and duration. • Perform as part of a group, taking direction from a conductor.
